Buddy Check: Can you hear me now?

In a day and age when communication is instantaneous, it can be very easy to lose contact with someone because of how busy one can become. The American Legion and its Legionnaires are no exception. As Legionnaires, our most sacred responsibility is to look out for each other and our fellow veterans. National Commander Brett Reistad has called for a Buddy Check during our National Week of Calling around the Legion's 100th birthday as a way to reach out to members and former members who may need help. Perhaps they have been waiting for a personal call or visit to renew or rejoin. No matter their situations, we can do as our founders did by making personal contact with veterans in our communities. The following letter was mailed to each post, but The Department of Iowa thought it a good idea to make it available for all of you to read:

Dear District and Post Commanders,

The American Legion was built on the power of personal contact. A century ago, when our organization was established, there was no other good way to grow and fulfill our purposes. Today, in honor of The American Legion's centennial, I'm asking you to do what our founders did. Make personal contact with members and former members of your posts and districts.

Call it a "buddy check." Ask them how they are doing. Ask if there is anything The American Legion can do for them. Perhaps they have been sick, lost a spouse or just need to know someone cares. Perhaps they simply forgot to renew their membership because no one called.

This is not a membership campaign. It's a comradeship campaign. Inside, you will find some steps you and your fellow Legionnaires can take to make personal contact with current and former members to let them know they have friends in The American Legion who want them to be part of our dawning second century.

Oratorical Winner Announced

The Department of Iowa's High School Oratorical Contest was held Sunday, February 3, 2019, the last day of Mid-Winter Conference. Three outstanding contestants gave their all to a full room and panel of 5 judges. Each contestant gave a prepared oration lasting up to 10 minutes and then was assigned a 3-5 minute topic based on the US Constitution. While most in the audience and the Department would like to see all three advance, there can only be one.

Winning for the second year in a row, high school junior Patrick Junker was announced as the winner for this year's Department Contest. Patrick is a student at Van Meter High School and was sponsored by American Legion Post #403 in Van Meter. Patrick, in addition to winning a \$2000 combined scholarship from the Department of Iowa and the Iowa Foundation, will have another chance to advance through national's contest April 5-7 in Indianapolis, for a chance to win an \$18,000 scholarship and title of The American Legion's High School Oratorical Contest Champion. Best of luck Patrick.

Consolidated Post Reports (CPR)

The American Legion's 2018-2019 Consolidated Post Report (CPR) will be mailed to each post mid-March. The CPR, which documents every activity a post fulfills in a 12-month (June 1-May 31) reporting period, is due to Department Headquarters no later than June 15, 2019. When using the paper form, send the original and one copy to Department Headquarters. Keep the third copy for your post records.

Whether it's providing funeral honors, sponsoring youth to attend a Legion program, conducting fundraising efforts or more, your post has something to report. A fillable 2018-2019 CPR form can be accessed through the Department's website www.ialegion.org/cpr and submitted by mail. Or, the CPR can easily be completed and submitted through myLegion.org; it's located under "Post and Department" options. The online form is the Legion's preferred method both on a state and national level, so posts are highly encouraged to complete them online.

After completing the form, click on the "Submit" button to send the report to National Headquarters; a copy will automatically be sent to Department Headquarters, as well. Online submission will be available at myLegion.org through July 1st, the cutoff for receipt of forms at National Headquarters.

Over the past decade, the men and women of our Armed Forces have been asked to fight two separate, difficult wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. Faced with tremendous challenges our troops

have responded with great skill, courage, and honor. The American Legion has always believed that when we ask our young men and women to fight in defense of our nation, we make a promise that they have the resources they need to do their jobs, and we promise to take care of them when they come home. As a nation, we have an obligation to support those who have sacrificed for us.

One of the biggest challenges facing the Department Service Office every day is the requirement to assist the VA with an understanding of what our veterans from all branches and from all conflicts are experiencing or have experienced, and that they can't just check their multiple issues at some door and call it a day.

The idea that adversity affects our brains and in turn, our ability to function, is born out of many scientific and medical studies. Initial research identifies how trauma can alter our brains and the more traumas we experience it can increase the likelihood of physical and mental illnesses, substance abuse, poor intellectual achievement, early death to name a few.

We need to understand the genesis of our veterans' issues because these are veterans with a head on their shoulders, but seemingly life has thrown them a few curveballs. We

owe a debt of gratitude to our men and women that have made that life-changing decision to give of themselves and to be willing to lay down their life even for other people. The Department Service Office is truly where we speak a language and use all our tools to assist veterans to come to grips with their capability to work through their life's issues. Every challenge the veteran successfully conquers serves to strengthen not only their will, but their confidence, and therefore their ability to confront future hurdles.

Experiencing adversity is a great excuse for some people not to take charge of their lives. We all face adversity in some way. What makes one individual succeed and another not, is how they handle their adversity. Many allow challenges to defeat them, but what our veterans need to focus on is developing into a stronger and wiser individual because of these challenges. There is no better way to do so than to develop and strengthen your personal in-house world.

Ralph Waldo Emerson, an American poet, philosopher and essayist during the 19th century said, “Finish each day and be done with it. You have done what you could. Some blunders and absurdities no doubt crept in; forget them as soon as you can. Tomorrow is a new day. You shall begin it serenely and with too high a spirit to be encumbered with your old nonsense.”

After experiencing an adverse event, we are all at a crossroads. Being at these crossroads is a powerful tool for both the veteran and the staff in the Service Office. Decision making is a tough process especially if the issues at hand are complicated and the significance of the outcome has major consequences for either the veteran or the staff. Decision making is a five-step process: 1) recognition of a situation that requires a decision; 2) identification and

development of alternative courses of action; 3) evaluation of the alternatives; 4) choice of one of the alternatives, and 5) implementation of the selected course of action.

A qualitative decision is more subjective and not just based on numerical statistical data. It is a more in-depth analysis of all possible factors that can affect the decision-making process. This kind of decision-making process considers other associated factors that may have some or major influence on collected data, and we all make qualitative decisions every day. Literally, we make thousands and thousands of them daily, mostly without even thinking.

In the Department Service Office, we believe there are four important skills the staff brings to our work environment; 1) good communications, 2) respect for those we work for and with, 3) integrity to work openly, honestly, and sincerely, and 4) an excellence in our work to settle for nothing less than the very best in everything we do.

In near future, there are going to be significant changes in the Veteran Affairs Administration's new appeal process. The new process takes effect 19 February 2019 and revamps how to resolve disagreements with being denied disability or financial benefits. Also on the radar will be the potential Blue Water Navy Bill being signed into law that hopefully will recognize those who have disabilities because of exposure to Agent Orange. I encourage all of you to seek out your County Veteran Service Officers for assistance with both issues or call the Service Office. These topics will be brought up again at district conferences, so bring your questions so that the Service Office can better provide you the answers.

No excuses, but Jessica was not at her best because she had laryngitis. She could hardly speak the night before the contest. She mustered enough volume to get through her two orations that morning. The audience and judges were

unaware of her problem. Even if the judges knew, there would be no exceptions made according to the rules.

The Second District had another contest winner chosen at Mid-Winter. Sherry Tang, of Bettendorf, won the Iowa Department's Fifth Grade Flag Essay Contest. She was sponsored by Le Claire Post #347. The 2nd District Legion Family Golf Outing will be hosted by Dyersville Post #137, Aug. 16-17, at Rolling Knolls Golf Course (2424 Second Ave. SE, Dyersville). Junior Shooting Sports Dept. Match

The Department will again have its 3-Position, 3x20 Air Rifle Match March 16, 2019, at Camp Dodge. Teams or clubs willing to participate can contact Department Headquarters for more information on registering.

The competitors will have a chance to place and win in their corresponding age categories, individual overall and team overall. The age categories are broken divided as follows:

Age Category 1 are athletes who reach their 17th or 18th birthday in the calendar year of the competition.

Age Category 2 are athletes who reach their 15th or 16th birthday in the calendar year of the competition.

Age Category 3 are athletes who will not reach their 15th birthday in the calendar year of the competition.

The match will be governed by the National Standard Three-Position Air Rifle Rules. The Department of Iowa utilizes the Orion Scoring System, a very accurate computerized scanner, which will provide up-to-date scores throughout the match. QR codes will be posted throughout the facility which can be scanned by an enabled smartphone for viewing.

The first relay will begin at 9 AM promptly. Please be advised that anyone interested in watching the match will be required to show identification when entering through the main gate at Camp Dodge. Thank you to all who have volunteered their time to make this match a success.


RAGBRAI

Online Transmittals

The "Process Membership" feature in myLegion allows American Legion Post Officers to renew, add new members and transfer-in existing members from other Posts. (NOTE: Posts can only transfer-in members that dues are being paid for.) This feature utilizes electronic payment methods via myLegion and eliminates the need for Post Officers to send the National/Department portion of the (3-part) membership cards and paper-checks to the Department Headquarters office.

Electronic check (Echeck) is the only payment method available when using this feature. The account must be a valid business checking or savings account held with a US Bank. Credit card payments are only accepted for foreign posts outside of the US that do not have a checking/savings account with a US Bank.

Each dues payment charged for a member is the sum of the National Per Capita plus Department Per Capita in effect at the time of the transaction. National Headquarters will handle payment of the Department Per Capita back to the Department Headquarters office.

The Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944 known as the GI Bill of Rights is possibly the primary accomplishment of The American Legion. That legislation came from the commitment of the veterans of WW I to ensure the WW II were welcomed home into a life that included benefits they had not received after November 11, 1918.

That commitment continued on and continues to live on today with the Post 9/11 GI Bill education benefits but also in the American Legion of Iowa Foundation with scholarship grants to many of the colleges in Iowa to assist veterans and family members with gaps in finances that the GI Bill does not cover.

Those gaps were especially hard on Kaitlin Teff, a junior at Upper Iowa University. Kaitlin is a single mother majoring in Conservation

Management with the hope of one day working for the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. An internship is a necessary part of that education, an internship that requires Kaitlin purchase appropriate work clothing and shoes.

Supporting her family while attending college left her with very little finances to purchase those supplies. Being the recipient of a \$1,000 scholarship allowed her to perform that internship and gain the experience necessary to continue toward her dream. Our donors made that happen.

Foundation Director Dennis Soppe is shown presenting a check for scholarships to Eldon Reiling, head of the Vet2Vet program at Northeast Iowa Community College. The scholarship recipients had not yet been chosen when the presentation was made but two students there would each receive \$1,000 from that grant.

Scholarship grants of \$2,000 each were awarded to fifteen colleges around the state of Iowa. That means at least 30 veterans or families

members received help with their educational expenses that the GI Bill does not cover. The path to their successful future got a little smoother for each of them thanks to our donors.

Scholarships like this have been awarded for several years now. Each year that list of veterans who have been helped through the commitment of The American Legion of Iowa Foundation grows longer. Our donors can take pride in being part of that commitment. We all served not to help ourselves but to ensure our fellow citizens continued to enjoy the freedom of this great country.

He was a tireless membership worker who was constantly recruiting members for not only his home Post, but throughout Benton County, the Third District, and Iowa. A humble man, Art would be surprised to think that there is an award named in his honor. He was a quiet leader who did not work for recognition, but volunteered because it was the right thing to do.

His wife, Sherry McLaughlin, Past National Auxiliary President had this to say: "I once told someone that The American Legion was Art's life." The young Legionnaire replied, "No, The American Legion was his passion."
