American Legion World Series

Dubuque County advanced to The Mid-South Regional Tournament this year in Hastings, Nebraska on August 4 - 8. There was an eight-team field to include: Pittsburg, KS, Oak Grove, MO, Grand Junction, CO, Cabot, AR, Gretna, NE, Washington, MO, Hastings, NE and Dubuque County, IA.

Dubuque County swept the tournament defeating Grand Junction, CO in game one, Hastings, NE in game two, Cabot AR in game three, Washington, MO in game four, and finally Cabot, AR again in the final game to advance to the American Legion World Series (ALWS). Shortstop Cole Smith was selected as the Mid-South Regional Tournament MVP.


The American Legion World Series, which is held annually in Shelby, NC started off to dry start but was quickly plagued with rain delays thanks to Tropical Storm Fred. Dubuque County's debut to the 2021 ALWS was only hours before the Chicago White Sox played the New York Yankees in the first Major League Baseball "Field of Dreams" in Dyersville, Iowa. Dubuque County unfortunately lost their first game to Beverly, MA but came back in game two to defeat defending champions, Idaho Falls. Dubuque County went on to play and defeat Midland, MI in their third game sending them to the semifinals with a record of 2-1.

The semifinal games lineup was between Tupelo, MS vs Idaho Fall, ID and Dubuque County vs Honolulu, HI. Each team entered the semifinals with the same record of 2-1. While Dubuque County started their game with an early lead of one to nothing. However, that would be all they score. Honolulu quickly evened the score and then drove in eight more runs to end Dubuque County's season with a 9-1 victory. The ALWS title game was

played between Honolulu and defending champions, Idaho Falls. Idaho repeated as the ALWS Champions with a 6-1 victory over Honolulu.

The 2021 Bob Feller Pitching Award went to Dubuque County's own, Aaron Savary, who compiled 25 strikeouts in national competition. This award is presented annually to the pitcher who has the most strikeouts in Regional and World Series Competition. Best known as the "Heater from Van Meter" or "Rapid Robert", Bob Feller was the first graduate to be elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame.

Dubugue County played hard and fought through every inning to represent Iowa well. According to Past National Commander, David Rehbein (Ames Post #37), "Dubuque County has established themselves and Iowa as among the best in American Legion Baseball." Thank you, Dubuque County Baseball, for a great season providing exciting play during the ALWS. It will come from a lot of hard work and effort from every individual, that is why I will be quoting one phrase from our Preamble, 'TO INCULCATE A SENSE OF INDIVIDUAL OBLIGATION TO THE COMMUNITY, STATE AND NATION'. Twenty years ago, on September 11, I was working in the parts department of an automobile dealership. I had come to the customer waiting area to speak with a

customer. The TV was on, and my customer was watching breaking news of an aircraft which had crashed into one of the World Trade Center towers.

As we watched, others began to gather around the TV. The sales staff, service technicians, customers and management all watched as the tower burned. And then a second plane struck the other tower. I remember turning to the group and saying, "We are under attack. We are at war."

The attack continued at the Pentagon in Washington, DC, and one attack ended at the hands of brave Americans in a field in Pennsylvania.

I had been out of the Navy for just shy of three years. My immediate thought was, "How are my shipmates responding right now." And I stopped to pray for their safety. It is a day that forever changed us as a nation.

Most of us remember where we were when we heard the news. I vividly remember watching the morning unfold on TV. Many American Legion members, including some from Iowa, were in Washington, DC, that day advocating

And now, twenty years later, we still remember. We remember the victims of that day and honor their memory. We remember the families they left behind. We remember the first responders we lost as they worked to save others.

We honor our military who have lost their lives in the war on terror and pray for the families they leave behind. We support our servicemembers who continue to protect us from the evils of the world. And we devote ourselves to the veterans who have returned home.

On the fifth anniversary of September 11th, I had the honor of laying a wreath at ground zero in New York, NY with Department Commander Milt Heifner. We were on an American Legion bus tour and planned the stop to remember the more than 3,000 American lives lost that day.

On that fateful day, September 11, 2001, we vowed that we would never forget. I haven't forgotten, and I know you haven't either. But remembering is not enough. We must honor their memory through our actions.

I hope every post in the Department of Iowa honors those we have lost and provides for those who have served bravely in the war on terror.

As I write this column, a crisis in Afghanistan is unfolding. I am unsure of how that crisis will have evolved by the time you read this article. But one thing is certain. The current crisis in Afghanistan hits hard for those who served there. Just as similar occurrences have hit hard for those who served in Irag, and even as far back as those who served in Vietnam.

Now is the time for us to reach out to the veterans in our community. Not just our members, but all those who have served. In recent years, we have initiated "Buddy Checks" to do wellness checks on our members. We must now extend that wellness check beyond our membership. Let our fellow veterans know that The American Legion is here to help.

We can help them by guiding them to resources and by giving them a forum to express themselves. I invite all of you to visit the national American Legion website and view the story of how a post in North Carolina turned Afghanistan anger into healing. The story can be viewed at:



Foundation Grants Break the Mold

Traditionally the grants approved by The American Legion of Iowa Foundation have been in the \$1,000 to \$2,500 range. That is except for the signature grants to the outstanding citizens of American Legion Boys State and American Legion Auxiliary Girls State. Those have been \$5,000 each.

With the growth in the Foundation's funds due to the generosity of our donors and the great work of Regions Bank, the Foundation Board of Directors decided to break out of that

mold this year with the funding of a \$7,000 grant to the lowa Veterans Home (IVH).

Many of the residents at IVH enjoy getting outdoors for the fresh air and

to visit with family members. There are shaded swings on the ground that serve that purpose.

Unfortunately, as time has passed along with the tornado in 2019 and 2020's derecho, those swings have become rundown and may not be safe. This is a picture of one of those swings in its current state. Obviously, upkeep is needed but replacement has been chosen as the best option.



IVH applied to the Foundation for a grant of \$12,000 to replace this swing. That may seem high but remember where this equipment is located and who will be using it. It is incumbent that safety be the first priority.

Replacement of the old swing will be finished this fall. Location of the new swing will be just inside the front gate. You will be able to see it from the street or for a better view, drive by on the grounds. Of course, obey any COVID restrictions if a resident is using the swing when you are there but drive by and take a look.

In 2020, nearly \$32,000 in donations came from the generosity of our donors. Through July 2021, those donors have contributed \$20,600. That puts us on track to exceed 2020 but that depends on your generosity.

This year, rather than just publish a list of grant recipients, we want you to know what the money you have donated is being used for. Elsewhere in this issue is a list of recipients with a short description of the project being funded if space permits. That list will also be posted on the Department website in the near future.

Remember in many cases, we were only able to fund a portion of the request as we did with IVH. The Board each year struggles with funding as many deserving requests as possible but still making a significant contribution to those that are approved.

Thanks to First District Director Larry Swann and his Solon crew for the golf outing that they sponsored again this year. That has become a successful fundraiser for the Foundation thanks to their hard work. Third District Director Bob Wenger is planning a "bug run" through the Legion Riders. We are looking forward to hearing more about that.

Thank you to everyone for their generosity. Without your caring and compassion, the Foundation could not assist our recipients in the great work that they do.

Why Does The American Legion of Iowa Foundation Exist?

That question may seem like one that we have talked about for years. That question though is, "What does The American Legion of Iowa Foundation do?" Those are different questions. We know what the Foundation does, assists those nonprofits in Iowa that do work that we support. To find why we exist, we have to go back into the early history of The American Legion in Iowa and take a look at our Iowa Legion culture as it developed.

It is common knowledge that Hanford MacNider of Mason City was elected the second Department Commander of Iowa and one year later in 1921 was elected to serve as the third National Commander of The American Legion. Not such common knowledge is the program that Pat Commander MacNider spearheaded two years later that became known as the "Iowa Idea".

Commander MacNider believed and spoke very eloquently at that convention that The American Legion would only realize its potential to lead this nation if the organization become active in working for and improving the lives of those who lived in the hometowns of the 11,000 posts then under charter. With that convention, the "lowa Idea" was transformed into the community service program of The American Legion.

The Iowa Idea was described as a program

that "might include the betterment of schools, recreation, park and playground facilities, furtherance of Boy Scout work, and active participation in Scout Troop organization and management, medical clinics, municipal music concerts, public forums, community buildings, city planning and all forms of better citizenship monuments".

Looking through that list, it is easy to see the type of projects and work that The American Legion of lowa Foundation supports but it took another step for the Foundation to come into being to continue making the lowa Idea a reality and that the idea remained relevant to lowa.

That step happened thanks to Past National Commander Don Johnson of West Branch. Following his year as Commander in 1964-65, Commander Johnson used the excess funds left in his campaign account to start a program that continues today and became The American Legion of Iowa Foundation. Knowing of the need to help young people attend college, he initiated the Donald E. Johnson scholarship that was awarded to the Outstanding Citizen of Iowa Boys State. That first recipient was Thomas Shives of Newton.

AS additional funds were donated, the Department saw the need to create a structure to continue the work of the "lowa Idea" through an organization whose purpose would be supporting that work. In 1978, The American Legion of Iowa Foundation was incorporated and has continued the work originally envisioned by Commander MacNider in the "Iowa Idea".

The Outstanding Citizen scholarship was extended to lowa American Legion Girls State. Several other Legion and Auxiliary programs are supported by matching funds from the Foundation as well as other community efforts around the state in the areas of Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation, Children and Youth and Community.

Under the leadership of an enlarged Board of Directors because of the generosity of many lowans, the Foundation draws the interest and income from a principal of \$2,500,000. Each year, the original lowa Idea supports more and more work across lowa. Scholarships for veterans and families, services to disabled lowans, community projects all benefit now because of Commander MacNider's lowa Idea over 100 years ago.

Now that you know why The American Legion of Iowa Foundation exists, the Board of Directors hope Iowans will continue to be generous. There will be more articles on the Department's website about the grant recipients and the work that they do. There will be more articles from our donors and why they donate. Be assured that when you make a donation, it will be promptly recognized with a think you either from HQ, one of our Directors or myself as President.



The shadow box containing my son's military boots, my grandfather's dog tags from World War I and my father's dog tags from World War II with a poppy laid across the toe of the boots was made by Past Sons of the American Legion Detachment Commander Jim Valentine. Jim, I thank you for this wonderful keepsake. It is extremely unique and definitely one of a kind. Thank you! Thank you, Vickie for being my Installation Chaplain and the beautiful prayer. Sandy, thank you for being my Installation officer and for asking me many years ago "So when do you think you will be Department President?" which instilled in me the confidence I needed to work toward achieving this position. I would also like to thank Darla and Lou for being my Sgt of Arms and Asst Sgt of Arms: and Karen and Pam for being my personal pages, thank you.

Sue Schlitter, thank you for being my pianist, Mike Deacon for sound system and David McNeil, vocalist, Thank you!

When I started this journey in 2005 at the insistence of my Mother, a past 5th District President, little did I know where it would lead me. Within a short time of attending District Conferences I was asked to serve as a District chairman. I accepted and the rest is history. Mom and I traveled to District and Department Conferences and Conventions. Soon my granddaughters ventured outside the comfort of the Unit's Junior Auxiliary meetings and became involved at District and then Department level and they began traveling with us and still do today. But we had a motivator, a mentor. tComing into play was a very kindhearted and caring woman, who mentored not only myself but my Mother, daughter and granddaughters to new heights, my dear friend and Auxiliary sister, Past Department President Diana Shadduck. When I initially started attending District and Department Mid-Winter Conference and Department Convention. I would ask myself what can I do to help our veterans or active military. I would soon learn there was so many options. It was just deciding which ones were what I thought I could personally do myself. I have volunteered numerous years for the Des Moines Homeless Veterans Stand down. Another year I volunteered to collect the school supplies for the children of the homeless veterans. The ALA members from across the state filled the back of my truck with supplies and with my families help, we packed the backpacks at home and they were ready for the Stand down. Ann Rehbein set up a weekend getaway for guilters at the Quilted Steeple. Well, I could sew and had made a couple of quilts so I thought I can do this. Since that initial trip I have made several guilts and presented a few for Ouilts of Valor. Every ALA member that volunteers steps up our mission of service to veterans, military and their families. When you volunteer, you join other like-minded people who care deeply about our country. The volunteer opportunities are flexible, so you do what you can when you can. In 2018-2019, the American Legion Auxiliary had a total of 7,087,662 volunteer hours and raised \$22,448,972 equalling \$1.1 Billion Dollars!!! What I want every Auxiliary member here today to understand is there is always something you can do to help our veterans, military and their families. We, the American Legion Auxiliary volunteering together with our Legion, the Sons of the American Legion and Riders can achieve so many goals. I would like to think my actions through volunteering, speak for my love of my country, veterans, our military and their families.

My priorities this year will be promoting The American Legion Family, volunteerism and membership. The American Legion Family working together for the betterment of our organization as a whole. When we help each other, we will grow and become stronger whether a Legion member, an auxiliary member, a Sons of the American Legon member or a Legion Rider. Our purpose, our mission is the same to help our Veterans, military and their families.

My Theme this year is: "STEPPING INTO THE NEXT CENTURY WHILE REMEMBERING THE PAST". We have come a long way the first 100 years and I am so excited to be a part of the next 100 as a member of the American Legion Auxiliary. My symbols are the dog tag and Poppy. We will now listen to the song "Dog tags" by Aaron Watson.

I chose for my scripture readings:

The 23rd Psalms

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters. He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me. Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

Greater love hat no man than this, that a man lay down his life for friends.

My songs this year are "In the Garden", "Dog Tags", "Some Gave All", and "God Bless the USA". My colors are Silver for the dog tag they wore, Gold for the medals they received, Red for the blood they shed.

My projects for 2021-2022 are: The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency, The Fisher House of Iowa City and Junior Camp. I would like to give you an insight to why I chose these projects. I grew up in a home where our military and veterans were respected. A picture hung on the wall in the living room at my grandparent's home of my Grandfather in uniform from World War I in 1918. My father, a WWII Army Staff Sargent, whom fought in the Pacific Theater on Okinawa, Saipan, battled PTSD (in his own way) all his life. I had 2 Uncles who served as well as many friends some not returning home alive. My Uncle, Robert Noehren, had a brother, Donald, who had enlisted in the Navy, but shortly after his return home, he reenlisted in the Army during the Korean War. He was sent to North Korea where he honorably served in the Korean Conflict as Corporal, with the Headquarters and Headquarters Service Co., 2nd Infantry Division. On November 30th,1950, he became a POW, the temperatures were dropping, and the men were not dressed for winter. His family did receive a letter from Donald during that time, telling of the lack of proper clothing, blankets and food. Donald developed pneumonia and passed away January 22, 1951. My Uncle and Aunt started the process with the US government trying to find Donald's remains. Needless to say, they did not live long enough to see him return home. Then in 2017 DNA given by my cousin matched bones that had been found in a dig in North Korea and returned to the United States. In this dig, two pieces of a femur



and a portion of his forehead; above the eye socket, were found. Donald Dean Noehren was laid to rest at Arlington National Cemetery with full military honors on April 3, 2017, with services at Fort Myer Old Post Chapel. After 66 years the family finally had closure. This was an extremely moving experience, a casket with a crisp dress uniform and medals depicting a soldier of great honor lying on the satin lining and pillow, a horse drawn Casson carrying a man who finally would be buried in his own country, the riderless horse and the sound of the bag pipes as he was laid to rest. At the present, more than 81,700 Americans remain missing from WWII, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, the Cold War, and the Gulf Wars and other conflicts. Out of the more than 81,700 missing, 75% of the losses are located in the Indo-Pacific, and over 41,000 of the missing are presumed lost at sea (i.e. ship losses, known aircraft water losses, etc.). I feel we as a country need to try and help other families who are still waiting for their loved one, whose remains have not been found to come home. David McNeill, is a retired 20-year veteran having served in the Army and the Army National Guard will sing – "Some Gave All" Thank you, David!

I had never heard of the Fisher House until our son was critically injured in Bagdad on August 7, 2003, losing both his legs below the knee and burn wounds when the Humvee he was driving hit an IED. Robert (BJ as he is known by), was flown to Lund Stall, Germany and then on to Brooks Army Medical Hospital at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, Texas. They had a Fisher House on the medical grounds in which Abby and the girls were able to stay while BJ healed from his severe wounds. The Fisher House was a Godsend and they lived there for several months. Fisher House

Foundation builds comfort homes where military & veteran families can stay free of charge, while a loved one is in the hospital. These homes are located at military and VA medical centers around the world. This program has saved military and veterans'

families an estimated \$500 million in out of pocket costs for lodging and transportation. Personally, I feel a person heals faster with the daily presence of family with and around them. Without the Fisher House this wouldn't have been possible.

And my 3rd project: Junior Camp. I have been volunteering at Junior

Camp since June 2012. I love seeing the Junior Auxiliary grow and learn about our Organization. Through this program, they develop friendships with other Junior from around the state, besides learning about our programs from the different chairman that volunteer their time to come and talk to the juniors, they learn from each other. Each Unit works with their Junior group differently and this shows and so we all learn together. I am extremely happy that the Auxiliary continues to have a program strictly for our junior members.

I would like at this time to introduce my family to you: Would my family please stand and join me. Introduce family... ask if anyone would like to speak, thank you! Our membership team this year will be promoting membership with the motto of "Stepping Up For Membership". They are committed to recruit, renew and rejoin and we are going all out to let you know we are "Stepping Up" our mission to help your Units

with membership goals!

Firefighter & Law Enforcement Officer of the Year



The American Legion of Iowa will give its Department Firefighter and Law Enforcement Officer of the Year Award to those who have exceeded the requirements expected of his or her position and has shown a distinct pattern of community service and professional achievement. The awards, which consider heroic acts, will be given annually at the Legion's Department Convention.

Fire departments and law enforcement agencies are encouraged to submit nominations to the Department National Affairs Committee. Applications must be received by November 30. The Department winner nomination packet will be forwarded to national for consideration of the National Firefighter and Law Enforcement Officer of the Year award, which is presented annually at the Legion's National Convention.

Firefighter nominees must be active firefighters and U.S. citizens. Emergency medical technicians (EMTs) are eligible only if they are certified firefighters.

Law enforcement nominees must be assigned to or fully recognized by municipal, county, district, or state police; highway patrol; sheriff's office or as a sworn federal law enforcement officer (FBI, Secret Service agent, U.S. Marshal, National Park Police, U.S. Capitol Police, etc.) Military police officers or investigators are eligible if they are state law enforcement certified.

All nominees must also reside and be assigned within the Department of lowa.

Nominations must be received by Department Headquarters no later than November 30th to be considered.

General Information:

The purpose of The American Legion of Iowa Essay Contest is to develop a deeper knowledge and appreciation for the United States Flag on the part of elementary level students. Other objectives of the contest include the ability to gain knowledge of flag etiquette and respect for the flag.

Awards:

Each of the three Department finalists will be recognized in the same manner as other youth champions and the top three winners will be invited to read their winning essay at the Department Convention. First, Second, and Third Place winners will receive \$500, \$300, and \$200, respectively, from The American Legion of Iowa and Iowa Foundation.

Contests:

Local contests will be conducted and judged by the local sponsoring Legion Post, and the winning essay, along with certification form completed, will be forwarded as follows:

- 1. Individual Legion Posts will forward one winning entry to their District Children and Youth Chairman, with signed Participation Application, postmarked by January 2, 2022.
- 2. District entries will be judged by the respective District Children and Youth Chairman, and sent to Department Headquarters, postmarked by January 22, 2022.
- 3. Department Children and Youth Committee will judge the nine District entries at Mid-Winter Conference, immediately following the Americanism meeting.

Essay:

The format for the essay is limited to the following: A one (1) page document containing 300 words or less, double-spaced, 12-point font, and the student's own words and effort. The essay is to reflect the student's perspective of what the United States Flag represents to them using facts from the United States Flag Code.

Eligibility:

Participants shall be citizens of or lawful permanent residents of the United States. All contestants must be students enrolled in the fifth grade in a public, parochial, military, private or state accredited home-school.

If you are a Post or Squadron who transmits membership online, the new MyLegion has been up and going for a few months now. While not all the functionality of the previous MyLegion is in the new one at this time, membership processing should be available to use. You can always try submitting one member before trying a bigger transmittal. For information on processing membership online

for both the Post and Squadron, you can go to ialegion.org/resources/ to find the Membership Processing Manual Vol. 2. This is only available online, allowing us to make changes as needed throughout the year. You can also check out the Resources section in MyLegion for information.

If you still have a few stragglers, we can still process their 2021 payments. Just remember, if you are submitting multiple membership years for processing to Department, use separate checks and separate transmittals for the different years being submitted. This will help your membership clerk process everything in a timelier manner and make her day easier. (She'll also greatly appreciate it!)

I know there have been some changes lately, but we'll all work through it. If you have questions, I'm happy to try and help out when I can.
