

Greetings Legionnaires of Iowa, Hope you all are having a great summer. Many things have happened over the last months. First, I would like to give a shout-out

to our Legion Riders, Patriot Guard, and others for all you do for our organization. From escorting the Moving Wall, the open-wheeled race cars to Newton, and the funds you raise for our Children and Youth programs - Thank You!

I must also thank our Legislators in Congress for passing the P.A.C.T Act. The road to passing this bill was

a bit bumpy. This deals with toxins that veterans were exposed to while serving. But by you Legionnaires contacting your Senators we persevered and now 3.5 million Vets are now eligible for VA Benefits.

In August your NEC and ANEC will be going to Milwaukee for our National Convention. One of the resolutions to be voted on will be to amend our National Constitution and By-Laws to allow multiyear and rolling memberships. If I understand this correctly members will be able to pay their dues 3-5 years in advance at current Post due levels. My question is who will keep records? Post Finance Officer, Dept Adjutant, or will it be at National? If you have thoughts on this let me know before Milwaukee. You are going to be hearing a lot about the "BE THE ONE" campaign. It deals with Veteran suicide. Our incoming National Commanders will be promoting this as we try to get on top of Veteran suicides. We all can help in this endeavor.

The Veteran's Administration recently announced it is adding nine rare respiratory cancers to the list of presumed service-connected

disabilities in relation to exposure to toxic chemicals. Exposure to these chemicals through air, water, or soil for Veterans who served any amount of time in the Southwest Asia Theater of Operations.

The following list: Squamous cell carcinoma (SCC) of the larynx, SCC of the trachea, Adenocarcinoma of the

trachea, Salivary gland-type tumors of the trachea, Adenosquamous carcinoma of the lung, Large cell carcinoma of the lung, Salivary gland-type tumors of the lung, Sarcomatoid carcinoma of the lung and, Typical and atypical carcinoid of the lung.

Any Veteran who had one of these cancers manifest to a degree of 0% or more at any time during or after separation would be eligible for service-connection benefits.

VA will begin processing disability compensation claims for Veterans who served any amount of time in the Southwest Asia Theater of Operations beginning Aug. 2, 1990, to the present, or Afghanistan, Uzbekistan, Syria or Djibouti beginning Sept. 19, 2001, to the present.

VA will contact impacted Veterans and survivors to inform them about their eligibility and will provide information on how to apply.

Veterans, dependents, and survivors who had claims previously denied for any of the below respiratory cancers would be encouraged to file a new or supplemental claim for benefits once the rulemaking process is complete.

The next major date for our district is October 22nd.



They also know that part of their entry fee will be used to fund a number of charitable projects in SE Iowa as well as the Iowa Foundation.

The outing has grown each of the four years with this year, the team was forced to turn away entries due to the course restrictions. The



generosity of the team to the Foundation has also increased each year. On July 30, the team invited each of the organizations that receive donations from the outing or grants

from the Foundation were invited to the Solon post to receive their awards. That award to the Foundation was \$8,000 by far the largest ever. That money will be deposited into the principal of the Foundation to be used to

generate income for future grants.

Among the organizations receiving grants that day in Solon was Miracles in Motion, an equine therapy program located in Swisher Iowa. They received \$3,000 to be used for their Fall Adaptive Riding and Horsemanship programs.

Those programs work with disabled youth and adults to learn to ride a horse to the best of their ability. Those programs will teach a total of 20 students to ride and be comfortable around horses. Their programs have been in operation for 34 years.

Two other grants were awarded to programs in the First District. Healing at



English River Outfitters is building a ramp and landing to allow disabled veterans use of their lodge. They received their check at Department Convention. Southeastern Community College in West Burlington received \$2,000 to provide scholarships for active military students or veterans.

How is the Foundation Grant Money Used?

On another page in this insert, you will find a listing of the grant applications that were approved at the 2022 annual meeting. That listing does not give you a very good idea of the actual use of the grant. With this issue we are beginning a better description of how that grant money is used and the benefits that come from it. Since the grant requests were just fulfilled a few weeks ago, the pictures may be from a previous grant.



Camp Courageous in Monticello received a grant of \$2,500 to assist in the construction of a mini-pitch soccer field. This field is completely enclosed to ensure the safety of the campers. It can also be used for basketball and other organized games.

Camp Courageous has seen the need for their services for the special needs population grow tremendously over the 50 years that they have served that population. They now provide services to over 10,000 children and adults in a year. They provide not only weeklong camping experiences but also respite care so that caretakers can replenish their

energy.

Shown in the picture is a zip-line that a previous grant helped construct. It is safe and usable for all ages and abilities including a ride by the Foundation President and spouse on Memorial Day.

The Essex Child Care Center was presented a check for \$1,000 by Director Brian Ring. That money is to help with their project of installing security cameras in each of their classrooms with cabling and storage to provide video record of any incidents that happen in the classrooms or playground.

The Essex Center serves approximately 70 children ranging in age from 6 weeks to 12 years. They are anxious to ensure that they



provide a safe, secure environment for their clients. Director Chuck Brunsting is shown presenting a check for \$2,000 to the



Northwest Iowa Community College Fund to be used for scholarships for active military, veterans. This is one of 16 such checks distributed to colleges and universities across our story lowa. These scholarships help with those expenses that are over and above GI Bill funds.

> One of the scholarship recipients from last year wrote a thank-you note to the Foundation

that perfectly expressed why these scholarships are so important. Tracy Hoover who attended Scott County Community College wrote:

" I grew up on the poverty line during my childhood, with much financial hardship in my life; and it pains me to say that I still struggle at times. However, it does not embarrass me to say that I cried with joy and relief upon reading the Legion's scholarship award letter (not awarded just once, but twice!). I feel so incredibly blessed. These funds help to cover what financial aid and other grants do not fully cover, i.e., what I am otherwise liable for and what I am strapped for financially.

I am on my way to a better life both because of my experience in the military and the pursuit of an RN degree. My RN degree is now in part possible because of YOU: this amazing foundation. This means more to me than I can ever fully express."

Tracy served six years in the US Army as a medic leading her toward a career in healthcare. She is a nontraditional veteran student who struggled at times in her education.

That is a small sample of the grants that were awarded and what those grants mean to the local community and the people that are served. You have been generous. Please continue that generosity to make these projects possible.

that the principal of the Foundation now exceeds \$2,225,000.

If you look, there is another page of this insert that lists the names of all of the donors since the summer issue of the Legionnaire. You might find the names of some of your friends in that listing. Heck, you might even find your name in that list. That is nothing more than just a list of names though. Names say almost nothing about the person and even less about what motivates that person to be who they are and do the things they do.

Let's start from the other end. Do we learn

anything about them based simply on their name appearing in that list? Of course we do. We know immediately that these are the people who care about

more than just their life and their family and their home and possessions. They do care about those things but they also know that we all need to give a little more to try to make our community and our state and our nation and the world a better place. Not just a better place for them but a better place in general.

Many people make donations to various causes. For most of those donations, though, the donation is spent and then is gone. It served its purpose but is that the best that can be done. It is not and the Iowa Legion Foundation has a better way. Every donation made to our Foundation is invested not spent. The proceeds from that investment are the funds that are spent on the projects that our donors care about. Eventually



those investment proceeds being spent equal the donation itself while the original donation is still there earning more interest.

Now what do we know about the people on that list. They are no longer just names. They are people who care about more than just themselves. They care about making things better for those around them and in fact, for those who live a long ways away and who they don't know. They care because that is who they are. Not only do they care but they are intelligent enough to understand how to make their donations keep on giving.

If your name isn't on that list, should it be? Are you one of those people who care but who want to see their donations continue to give? We hope so. The Foundation Board has set a goal of \$3,000,000. It will take people like those we just described to reach that goal. What will that do? When we reach that goal, our grant total will be \$150,00 each year. You will make that happen and can take pride in who you are, what you done and what you have helped create.



Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation is committed to serving the medical needs of our veterans through the service provided to them out of our many VA medical centers around the country. Here in Iowa we have the Des Moines VA Medical Center and the Iowa City VA Medical Center. These two centers have ALA Representatives serving our veterans. In addition, we have Associate Representatives in Sioux Falls and Omaha. Although not a VA Medical Center, we like to recognize our own Iowa Veterans Home where we serve our veterans and/or their spouses.

The VAMC facilities and CBOCs (Community-Based Out-Patient Centers) need volunteers so if you have time on your hands and want to volunteer a few hours a week, a month to serve our veterans, please consider it. Let me know if you are interested and I will direct you to the proper contact.

Check out the needs lists of the various facilities just mentioned above. You can find them on the Department website. Please consider donating in-kind items and/or monitory donations.

If you donate monetarily, be sure to send your check payable to the American Legion Auxiliary, Department of Iowa, and earmark it for the facility you wish the money to go to and the purpose for which you wish it used.

If you are going to provide in-kind items, please be sure to contact the facility first to see if there is a need for the items and, if so, be sure to include a donation form and value your items as the VA will not put a value to them. Also, contact them when you are delivering the items so someone can meet you at the entrance to accept your items. Due to Covid visitors are not allowed in the facilities at this time.

Consider providing baby gift baskets for the women's clinic or buddy baskets for homeless veterans transitioning from homeless status to an apartment. Providing figit blankets for the dementia units is another potential service you can provide your VAMCs. Be sure to check with the facilities first to see if there is a need.

If you want to help our homeless veterans, consider volunteering at a stand down. Sioux Falls is scheduled for September 23 and the Des Moines stand down is scheduled for September 16-18.

Please either volunteer your time at a local VAMC or CBOC (Community-Based Out-Patient Center). They have given so much to serve us. We can do so much to repay that service and sacrifice through the VA&R program. As President Jayne's theme states "Together" we can do this for our veterans.

*This step needs to be completed before December 31, 2022.

*Do NOT pay any money yet!!

2. Select a Girls State citizen(s) and give her the code to register. Each citizen gets their own special code.

*This step needs to be completed before March 31, 2023. Make sure your citizen completes ALL steps of registration. (You will both get friendly reminders if she does not.)

*After your citizen registers, your Unit will receive an invoice for \$400.

3. Pay the invoice for each filled reservation.

*This step must be completed by April 15.

*If reservations are unpaid, it will be expected that the citizens will not be attending.





Moville started early in the regional tournament against the team from Millard South, Nebraska. Moville's



Boys State looks forward to next year. To all the American Legion Post Adjutants, please be on the lookout for information regarding the 2023 session. There are some major changes to how Boys State will run its database, so Post Reservations and Delegate Registrations will look a little different. All will still be required to be completed online, however, it will look a little different.

The changes will allow posts to view more information regarding their delegate registrations. Also new will be how billing is done. Posts will have the option to be billed from the software once they have secured delegates. This will help reduce the time and costs involved with issuing refunds for unfulfilled reservations.

Department Headquarters will begin to take post reservations for the 2023 American Legion of Iowa Boys State Program soon. The dates next year have been set for Sunday, June 11 - Friday, June 16, 2023. Posts will need to make a post reservation online. Each Post Adjutant will receive information regarding the Post Reservation and Delegate Registration processes along with some changes. Please do not disregard this letter and information as it may delay your process. If your post does not have a computer, find someone who does and ask them to help.

As a reminder, The Boys State Board of Directors voted to eliminate two different prices for Boys State. Like the 2022 session, Post Reservations have a flat fee of \$250 per delegate regardless of date.

TIMETABLE AND DEADLINES

October 15, 2022 – Post Reservations open. A Post Chairman's Guide will be made available online to guide you through the candidate selection process.

January 15, 2023 – Online only Delegate Registration opens. Instructions for candidates to register were provided to posts via email after they completed their online Post Reservation. Samsung Scholarship Applications will be made available through the National website once available.

April 1, 2023 - Post Refund Request Deadline - Requests must be completed online at www.ialegion.org/refunds no later than this date.

April 1, 2023 - Delegate Registration Cut Off – This is the LAST day for candidates to register. No exceptions will be made for post or candidate negligence.

March-May 2023 - District Orientations will take place (see Department website or your district's chairman for more details).

June 11-16, 2023 - The American Legion Boys State Program held at Camp Dodge in Johnston, Iowa.

Firefighter & Law Enforcement Officer of the Year

The American Legion of Iowa will give its Department Firefighter and Law Enforcement Officer of the Year Award to those who have exceeded the requirements expected of their position and have shown a distinct pattern of community service and professional achievement. The awards, which consider heroic acts, will be given annually at the Legion's Department Convention.



Fire departments and law enforcement agencies are encouraged to submit nominations to the Department National Affairs Committee. Applications must be received by November 30. The Department winner nomination packet will be forwarded to national for consideration for the National Firefighter and Law Enforcement Officer of the Year award, which is presented annually at the Legion's National Convention.

Firefighter nominees must be active firefighters and U.S. citizens. Emergency medical technicians (EMTs) are eligible only if they are certified firefighters.

Law enforcement nominees must be assigned to or fully recognized by municipal, county, district, or state police; highway patrol; sheriff's office, or as a sworn federal law enforcement officer (FBI, Secret Service agent, U.S. Marshal, National Park Police, U.S. Capitol Police, etc.) Military police officers or investigators are eligible if they are state law enforcement certified.

All nominees must also reside and be assigned within the Department of Iowa.

Nominations must be received by Department Headquarters no later than November 30th to be considered.

General Information

Awards:

Each of the three Department finalists will be recognized in the same manner as other youth champions and the top three winners will be invited to read their winning essays at the Department Convention. First, Second, and Third Place winners will receive \$500, \$300, and \$200, respectively, from The American Legion of Iowa and Iowa Foundation.

Contests:

Local contests will be conducted and judged by the local sponsoring Legion Post, and the winning essay, along with the certification form completed, will be forwarded as follows:

1. Individual Legion Posts will forward one winning entry (please retain a copy) to their District Children and Youth Chairperson, with a signed Participation Application, postmarked by January 5th of the current program year. If the 5th falls on a weekend, then postmarked by the next business day.

2. District entries will be judged by the respective District Children and Youth Chairperson, and sent to Department Headquarters, postmarked by January 22nd of the current program year. If the 22nd falls on a weekend, then postmarked by the next business day.

3. Department Children and Youth Committee will judge the nine District entries at Mid-Winter Conference, immediately following the Americanism meeting.

Essay:

The format for the essay is limited to the following: A one (1) page document containing 300 words or less, double-spaced, 12-point font, and the student's own words and effort. The essay is to reflect the student's perspective of what the United States Flag represents to them using facts from the United States Flag Code.

Eligibility:

Participants shall be citizens of or lawful permanent residents of the United States. All contestants must be students enrolled in the fifth grade in a public, parochial, military, private, or state-accredited home school.



Good job with membership in 2022. We finished the year with 955 new members and 494 transfers from Department Post 729. This gives us a final number of 36,122 paid members, this allowed 36 posts to reach 105% and 80 posts finished the year at 100-104%.

The goal that National gave the Department of Iowa is 37,040, which is an increase of 918 members. If we work as a T.E.A.M. we can not only meet but exceed this goal.
