2023 Department Oratorical Contest

The Department of Iowa's High School Oratorical Contest was held Sunday, February 12, 2023, the last day of the Mid-Winter Conference. Three outstanding contestants advanced from the local post to the main stage at the Department Final in front of a full room and panel of 7 judges. Each contestant gave a prepared and then was assigned a 3-5-minute topic based on the US Constitution. First place was awarded to Tori Paga of Hiawatha, Iowa. Tori is a Sophomore at John F. Kennedy High School. The title of her prepared oration is Democracy Means the People's Power. Tori is the daughter of Raghavendra and Tarakeshwari Paga. She will compete in the National Oratorical Contest on April 21st in Indianapolis for a chance to win a large scholarship of \$25,000 and the title of national champion. - <u>Department Convention Committees:</u> The Convention Committees at Department Convention recommend action for the Convention on the resolutions presented to the convention as well as other business assigned to them. Much of the deliberation of the Department Convention occurs in the Convention Committees. Each district must assign one delegate to each of the Convention Committees. Those assignments are made at the Spring District Conference. If you intend to have an impact on the decisions of the Department Convention, one of the most effective ways to do that is by being assigned to a Convention Committee at your District Spring Conference.
- 2. <u>National Convention Delegates & Alternates</u>: The delegates and alternates to the National Convention are elected at the District Spring Conferences and ratified at the Department Convention. This year the convention will be held in Charlotte, North Carolina.
- 3. <u>Department Leadership School</u>: Each year the Department of Iowa offers a leadership school to instruct and educate District and Department leaders and future leaders of The American Legion. The Department covers the cost of six (6) attendees per district, and those selections are made at the District Spring Conference.
- 4. <u>District Officer Elections</u>: District Officers are elected at the District Spring Conferences for the coming year (July-June). Becoming a District officer provides a unique leadership opportunity for those Legionnaires up to the challenge.
- 5. <u>District Chair Appointments</u>: Those wishing to have a positive impact on our programs and policies are encouraged to seek appointments to District positions for our American Legion programs.
- 6. Officer & Committee Reports: Do you simply want to learn more about The American Legion? Then come to a District Spring Conference to hear reports from Department and National officers, Department Headquarters staff members, Department Service Office staff members, and Department and District Commission and Committee Chairs. All will help you gain knowledge of American Legion programs, policies and positions.

Anyone seeking to learn more about The American Legion or wanting to get more involved is encouraged to attend your District Spring Conference. I have received many questions regarding memorial and burial benefits. Arranging a funeral for a loved one can be difficult and emotionally draining. It is best to

be prepared as much as possible ahead of time, but this is not always possible. It helps to know what type of assistance the Department of Veterans Affairs can provide with memorial and burial benefits for the Veteran and his or her family.

Most Veterans are eligible for memorial and burial benefits through the Department of Veterans Affairs

(VA). If eligible, the VA may assist with rites, flags, headstones, markers, funeral expenses, or plot allowance, and transportation to a cemetery. The spouse or dependents are eligible for a government headstone or marker, only if they are buried in a national or state cemetery.

First, the funeral cost must be been paid in full, the person who paid for the funeral expenses can submit a request for reimbursement by submitting VA Form 21P-530. There is a 2-year time limit in which the family needs to file for burial reimbursement. If the application is not submitted correctly, the VA will notify you to correct and resubmit within 1 year.

The Department of Defense can assist the family with military honors, consisting of folding and presentation of the United States flag, and the playing of Taps.

Here is a list of forms to help assist in the planning of burial benefits:

VA 40-130 Claim for Standard Government Headstone or Marker.

VA 40-1330M Claim for Government Medallion for Placement in Private Cemetery.

VA 21-2008, Application for United States Flag for Burial Purposes

VA 10-2065 Funeral Arrangements.

VA 40-0247 Presidential Memorial Certificates.



Can do:

-Process membership – This is faster than sending it to Department since you'll get members entered into the system right from home or your Post!

-Update member records – Anything from an address to a name, and so much more, keeping member information up-to-date.

-Add multiple demographics to a member's profile – For example, does the member have multiple war eras they served in? Both can be listed, too.

-Print member cards – People with Post access can go to a member's profile and print their card. Will it be the same? No, since it's on standard paper. But is it a printed card? YES!

-Find 729 members in your area either by zip code or distance from a zip code.

-Print an up-to-date roster for your Post.

Can't do: Note: Again, not an extensive list, but some stuff to be aware of.

-Update Post Officers – That's still done through a form sent to Department.

-Find weekly membership report – Posted weekly to our department website.

-Find forms Department needs – Most of these are available as a PDF Fillable form through the Department's Resources page. Just find the right category and select the form!

Even if you can't do everything in MyLegion, it still is a fast way to keep track of and update your membership for your Post.


