




2024 Department Oratorical Contest

The Department of lowa's High School Oratorical Contest was held Sunday, February 4, 2024, the last day of the Mid-Winter Conference. Three outstanding contestants advanced from the local post to the main stage at the Department Final in front of a full room and panel of 7 judges. Each contestant gave a prepared and then was assigned a 3-5-minute topic based on the US Constitution. First place was awarded to Karli Roth of Earlham, Iowa. Karli is a Junior and homeschooled. The title of her prepared oration is We The People: Our Nation's First and Final Check and Balance. Karli is the daughter of Joseph and Sarah Roth. She will compete in the National Oratorical Contest on May 17-19 in Hillsdale, Mich for a chance to win a large scholarship of \$25,000 and the title of national champion. Karli is sponsored by Waukee American Legion Post #737 Waukee, IA. Congratulations Karli and best of luck. Runner-up honors go to Lily Moeller, a MOC-Floyd Valley High School Sophomore, and an Orange City resident sponsored by Pressman-Kosters American Legion Post #329 in

Orange City. Third place finish went to Divya Ramadugu, a sophomore from Cedar Rapids Iowa. Divya is sponsored by American Legion Post #298 Marion, IA. In the history of the National Oratorical Contest, Iowa has had 3 champions: Jennifer Demmon (1986), Max Miller (2000), and Patrick Junker (2019). Again, best of luck Karli, and congratulations on the Department title. We wish to thank all the volunteers who have given their time from the local to Department contests. In 1923, The American Legion had been functioning for four years. Veterans' issues had received much of the attention of our organization. The American Legion began to

see more clearly that the strength of the Legion would eventually lie in the strength of local posts. We knew that our influence on legislative problems on the state and national levels would depend on the influence of local posts in communities across the nation.

With this thought in mind, Hanford MacNider, Past National Commander from lowa, in an informal meeting of Past National Commanders at the Palace Hotel in San Francisco suggested just prior to the opening of the National Convention of 1923. He suggested that a program of local community service be adopted as a vital part of The American Legion's programs. The idea was presented and enthusiastically advocated by the lowa delegation at the National Convention. The resolution stated that any endeavor which would tend to make a community a more pleasant and happy place in which to live would also create a greater national pride and foster a more abiding love of country.

Since the idea of making local community service an outstanding feature of American Legion programs throughout the country was suggested by an lowan and was advocated at the National Convention by the lowa Department, it soon became known as "The lowa Idea." Since 1923 the work of The American Legion in community service has been constantly growing. The lowa Idea of community service is now considered one of the four pillars on which our organization is founded.

From our earliest years, American Legion posts have been actively involved in service to the community. We have been involved in the betterment of schools, parks and playground facilities, medical clinics, community buildings and veterans' monuments. We have provided funding and equipment for fire departments, emergency medical services, 4H, Boys Scouts, community youth programs and more. All these contributions stand as monuments to The American Legion and its members.

I have long considered community service a vital part of every American Legion post. When most Americans think of The American Legion, the National and Department organizations are not what come to mind. It is the local post. The work we do in our communities defines The American Legion to the public. The image of the local post is the image of The American Legion.

I have fond memories of my post when growing up. I remember the Legionnaires leading parades, setting up the town celebration, and other community service projects. The post was, and still is, the centerpiece of the community. We must strive to make all our American Legion posts centers of our communities again.

I once visited a post that wanted to turn in its charter. They were down to 24 members, had no building, no money, and were participating in few programs. During our conversation with the members, the district commander asked what activities the post had been involved with in the past. The members took turns telling stories of post achievements in the community. When the conversation ended, it was stated that if they closed the post, their community would never have those things again. That was all the convincing necessary to save the post. Today, they are a strong, vital post, participating in multiple programs and providing many services to the community. I believe we need to focus on developing leadership in our Posts. If we concentrate on developing leadership on the local level, our Posts will become stronger, and we will become a much more effective organization.

The services we provide to our communities will also influence the strength of our local posts. By becoming more active and more visible in our communities, more members will want to join our ranks. But this is not about

VA Copayment Responsibility and Debt Options

The Department of Veteran's Affairs (VA) offers a vast array of services,

and multiple options available to help pay your copayments required by your insurance.

You as a Veteran are responsible for your copayments for certain services. If you do not pay these in good faith, and in a timely manner, this debt can be sent to the Department of Treasury for collection. If at any time you are unable to financially make the copayments, the Department of Veteran's Affairs (VA) can help with financial arrangements such as repayment plans or a waiver within 30 days of the

initial billing by completing VA Form 5655 on VA.gov/VA forms.

Or by calling 1-800-827-0648.

If you receive VA benefit payments, these benefit payments could be used to collect any unpaid delinquent copayment debt. The debt is turned over to the Treasury Debt Management Service after 120 days for collections. At that point in time, Treasury will issue an official notification letter to you to make payment arrangements and if arrangements are not made, Treasury will begin collections.

If arrangements are not made, the following actions could take place. Any eligible Federal payments including income tax refunds, Social Security benefits, retirement payments, or any Federal or State payments can be withheld. Also, Treasury can also collect the debt from civilian salaries through wage garnishment, or they can collect the debt

through private collection agencies. Once a debt is turned over to the Department of Treasury, the Department of Veteran's Affairs (VA) can no longer accept payments for that debt, it must go through the collection agency that your debt was turned over to

If you have questions or concerns regarding copayment debt you are encouraged to contact the Facility Revenue Office at your local VA medical center or call the Health Resource Center's number listed at the top of your billing statement. You have the right to dispute any debt you deem incorrect.

One of the biggest issues I hear about is when I visit various posts as the 4th District Commander is membership. While we, the American Legion, serve veterans who have served in the military for

any period and received an Honorable Discharge from their specific service, the question remains, how do we keep our current members and how do we "find" new members to join our Post?

While we know that age plays a significant part in the longevity of a post, as members "age-out" and we lose them to illness and death. But what about the younger members of our post? We work hard to keep them each year by offering them a reason to stay. Any good and productive post knows their members well enough to know "what's in it for them?" Is it the events that your local post puts on each year? Is it the reputation of the organization in the community as a support structure for any veteran that needs

assistance with transition from the military? Perhaps it's the medical benefits from a VA package up for review, or a simply the comradery that so many veterans miss with other veterans since their days in uniform?

While we work hard to keep our current members, the unknown each year is where to find these "new members" that live amongst us. The best way to think of it is, they may be active-duty veterans today, but retired or separated tomorrow. But the numbers are not in our favor! We stand to lose 20,000 MORE military each year than enter the service in the first place. In 2023, our Department of Defense was made up of 2.86 military members between the 5 branches. 2,079,142 military and 778,539 civilians. So, with 180,000 entering the service each year and 200,000 leaving the service each year, why is it so hard to find these "new" members to the American Legion?

The answer is this? Do we truly know WHY they left the service, and can we support them in the civilian world? Can we, as the American Legion, offer them something that they may not even realize they need? The answer of course is YES! Did they leave due to medical concerns or on-going conditions that will need care through the VA or local civilian hospitals and clinics? Did they leave due to a strong desire to spend more time with their family (and not deploy away from them on a regular basis)? Are we offering family events that the Veteran can bring their family to to meet this desire to spend time with their family? Or did they only serve for 2 or 3 years and don't feel "like a real veteran"? It's our job to tap into this and remind them just how much of a "real veteran" they truly are.

So, as you see our youth graduate high school and join the various branches of the service, follow their progress and watch to see if they return home after 2, 4 or maybe 20 years. Welcome them (and often their new families) back with open arms. Look for the guy at the gas station in town or the grocery store wearing the Army hat or Air Force sweatshirt and start up a conversation...and then, just invite them to coffee...they rest will fall into place with just a kind word and a simple hello!

Greetings, loyal readers!

Mid-Winter is gone, District Conferences are underway, antd Easter is early this year. Hopefully, all your current members have renewed and now you can focus on finding new members.

When adding a new member to your Post, you may ask, "How do I do that?" If you do it online, you go into a transmittal like normal, then click "Add/Transfer Member." Select "New member- never been a TAL member or SAL member," then input all their information (anything with an asterisk must be filled out). Once you hit save, they'll be added to your transmittal and have their ID number assigned. You then finish your transmittal like usual. If you send membership to Department, you'll fill out the National/Department portions of a blank card from your stack and mail it in with a check and transmittal form like you usually do.

Other questions that you might have:

-Do I need to send a member data form or the application to Department? Nope! You can file the application away at your Post and save the MDFs for other things.

-Do I need to give my new member a card? Yes! You can fill out a blank one and provide that to the member, or you can print one from MyLegion once the payment processes.

If your new member is actually a member in another Post but new to you, then you'll follow the steps for Transferring.

Remember, membership awards are calculated 30 days prior to Convention, so you've still got some time to meet your goal. Good luck! And, if you've ever wondered how the Easter bunny leaves, he makes an eggs-it.

Department of Iowa Finance

The Department of Iowa Finance team met prior to Midwinter conference to secure some recommendations for the utilization of Gold Club Funds as well as review the Wish Lists received from the VA Medical Center representatives.

With the approval of the DEC at their meeting on Friday Morning \$1000 from the Gold Club was given to the American Legion Department of Iowa to aid in the updating of the department facilities.

Wish list funds to the tune of over \$10,000 was split and given to each of the VAMC to be used for their wish lists. A few of the requests are: Bowling Ramp, Craft Supplies, Ham Radio Antenna, 32"TV, Gift cards for food and gas, Shooting Sports dues, Catrike (hand driven bike), Baby shower diaper bags, and a Bariatric Scooter.

Has your unit noticed that members are paying online? Where is your portion of the money? Every couple of weeks the Department of Iowa receives the Department and (if any) the unit portion of those dues received via the online payment method. In November if your unit had funds from either online OR PUFL members totaling over \$10 those checks were issued and sent to you our next mailing of those checks over \$10 will be in May. Most of the members paying online have no funds going back to the individual unit. What happens to funds under that \$10 threshold? At the end of the fiscal year credit memos are issued and those funds applied to the next years obligation forms.

Now is a good time to reevaluate your unit dues.

Unit data forms are due April 15th. Remember, the Department of Iowa had a dues increase effective with the 2025 dues year. Your unit dues must reflect at least a \$28 membership dues rate for 2025 membership This is the amount due to the National organization (\$18) and the Department organization (\$10) You can find that unit data form here: https:// iowaala.org/wp-content/uploads/2021/02/2024-25data-form-Direct-Billing.pdf



If you no longer want to have access to ALAMIS simply call the office and have your name removed.


Lastly, let's talk about AEF, Child Welfare, Creative Arts and other donations made to the Department of Iowa. Funds received for the VA Medical Centers are immediately deposited into their individual accounts and a monthly report is sent to them. AEF, Child Welfare and Creative Arts are distributed at a minimum of annually with anything over \$75 in the individual account distributed quarterly, generally the second month of the quarter.



Wreaths Across America-2023 The American Legion Blue Grass, Iowa, Post 711

On December 16, 2023, The American Legion Blue Grass, Iowa - Post 711, was honored to host a NaEonal Day of Tribute – Wreaths Across America (WAA). An experience, by many that will never be forgoPen where legion members and the community joined together to remember the fallen, to honor those who serve, and to teach the next generaEon the value of freedom by joining over 2 million volunteers naEonwide in placing wreaths on veterans' headstones.

Since 2012, it has been a tradiEon of Post 711 to place approximately 20-30 sponsored wreaths on the Rock Island Arsenal NaEonal Cemetery graves and render a salute. About 3 years ago, Al McDonnell (WAA Post 711 Coordinator) received a request for a grave specific wreath order from a Florida woman who wanted a wreath placed on her grandfather's grave who was buried in the Confederate Cemetery located on the Rock Island Arsenal Island. Al McDonnell called her and told her the post would be honored to do this for her. A[er placing the wreath Al took a picture of the grave with the wreath and sent it to her. She was elated and began sharing the picture with family & friends and for the next several years 4 wreaths were laid. In 2023, it expanded to ten wreaths. Currently, there are 1,952 Confederate Soldiers buried at the Confederate Cemetery out of 1,960 that died while imprisoned. Eight prisoners' remains were dug up and returned to their families in the South a[er the war. Two prisoners were shot while trying to escape. The other deaths were caused by diseases that ran rampant i.e. by Dysentery, Smallpox, and Pneumonia.

The prison was built in the summer of 1863 and prisoners began to arrive in December of that same year which was one of the coldest winters on record. It was built to hold 10,000 and was ill prepared for the surge of over 12,000 prisoners who came from the South where the weather is much warmer. As Al, conEnued to talk to the granddaughter of a Confederate Soldier, she said her granddad wrote and told how the local community and churches donated blankets, clothes, and food to assist with the prisoners' daily needs.

These men deserve to be honored as well as any other veteran out of respect to their families. Even though they were defeated, they were sEll Americans and buried 1,000 miles from their home and families.

Over Eme, just like the Florida woman's story, it became apparent to Post 711 that others purchasing wreaths also wanted them to be placed on a specific family member's grave and may not have the means to do so since if they no longer live in the area or are not able to physically lay the wreath due to their age or health. Thus, the post began to offer Grave-Specific-Placements for others. As an example, Post 711 was Chartered in 1949 and currently has only one chartered member le[so this Grave-Specific-Placement service is gratefully offered year a[er year and much appreciated.

In 2022, with a strong belief in the mission statement of WAA to Remember, Honor and Teach, Post 711 started holding a Wreaths Across America ceremony at 11:00 am at the post hall for the community followed by refreshments before going to the Blue Grass Iowa Cemetery to lay sponsored wreaths where approximately 200 veterans have been laid to rest, daEng back to the War of 1812, Civil War, WWII, Korea, and Vietnam. In 2023, Post 711 had sponsors for approximately 200 wreaths to honor the fallen in various cemeteries with hopes of increasing sponsorship in 2024.

As the WAA tradiEon conEnues to grow at Post 711, so has the expansion of honoring our veterans. On Dec 16, 2023, Post 711 Chaplain (Kirk Graham) rendered a salute by tolling the bell at the Blue Grass Cemetery

and then travelled 40 miles to place a grave-specific wreath in West Liberty, Iowa on a headstone of a helicopter pilot (Bruce Smith) who was shot down in Iraq (2003), twenty years ago.
